

KNOX COUNTY – ONE QUESTION

BACKGROUND

On January 12, 2007, the Supreme Court of Tennessee made it clear that for the first time in Knox County's 215 year history, we can have whatever form or structure of local government that Knox County's citizens approve.

THE QUESTION

A citizen driven process known as *Knox County – One Question* has been organized to attempt to answer the key question presented by this new opportunity:

WHAT CHANGES, IF ANY, DO THE CITIZENS WANT TO MAKE TO THE FORM OR STRUCTURE OF GOVERNMENT IN KNOX COUNTY?
