Oak Ridge Kennel Club Meeting Minutes: *October 2, 2008*

Our program was Diane Cox, Roane State Community College, who came to tell us about Friends of the Expo, a foundation recently created to raise money for Expo Center projects such as the installation of stadium seating which is outside their normal operating budget. In addition to sponsoring a seat for \$100, another fundraiser being planned is Celebration at the Expo, a dinner show planned for January 17.

At 7:30 President Donna Burchi called our business meeting to order. Robert Pless moved that the August meeting minutes (not approved at the September meeting for lack of a quorum) and the September meeting minutes be approved as printed in the *Woofers*. Marg Ellis was the second, and the vote was unanimous for approval of the August and the September minutes without changes. Pat Vogel gave the Treasurer's report: about \$15,000 in our operating account, with the training class funds not yet deposited.

Building: Dirt has been delivered for the agility field, and Robert Herrell will use his tractor to spread it. Joe McDonald, a surveyor, will assist in getting the proper grade for drainage. There was discussion about whether to use seed, hydro-seed or sod, whether to use fescue or Bermuda grass (roughly \$4500 for sod, doubled with installation). Several people will check prices with alternate contacts. Board e-mail discussion and vote will be required prior to any action/purchase. The Kubota mower is working well, and Building Chair Robert Pless thanked Pat Vogel for her recent donation of a large TV for use in training classes.

Agility: Chair Frances Hart has the January trial planned and will request volunteers in the December *Woofers*.

Training: Collection of Fall training fees is around \$2500. Four-week November classes are almost full, but January classes are still in the planning stage. There was discussion about whether it would be permitted for teachers to "transfer" accumulated class credits to another person, and it was determined that the Board would review their vote taken at a prior meeting

Show: Show Chair Donna Burchi reviewed the committee heads that she now has, and noted that she still needs a sanctioned match chair, catalog advertising chair, and hospitality chair. Donna will make a list of volunteers needed for the May show and post it for training class participants to sign up. A descriptive list of show position responsibilities was in the October *Woofers*.

Fund Raising: President Burchi asked about a photographer for Halloween and/or Christmas pictures, and was told about Barb Knowlton's friend, Karen, who is a professional. Karen has taken photos at Halloween festivities and at tracking events in the past.

Insurance: Jeff Banta continues to work on locating building insurance and a policy to cover our officers. Many companies hesitate to insure us because we have the dogs on the premises. Several members had suggestions for Jeff to pursue.

Correspondence: A donation for landscaping was received as a memorial for Marg Ellis' mother, and an ORKC note of thanks was sent. Agility trial in May has been approved by AKC.

Old Business: The Christmas party will be held at the Wildcat Den in Oak Ridge on 12/06. A map and article will be put in the December *Woofers*.

New Business: Marg Ellis brought up the possibility of being a minimal corporate sponsor to the Roane State Expo Center to have a banner and be on their advertising. This topic will be carried to the Board meeting for discussion.

Adjournment: The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

Zita earned her Companion Dog (CD) title at the Obedience Club of Chattanooga's show on Saturday, October 18th, with a **1st place** finish! Zita is a German Shepherd, owned and trained by Shannon Shepherd!

Yep, He's A Bird Dog!

Cosmo tested his hunting skills at NAVHDA (North American Versatile Hunting Dog Association) Natural Ability, on October 12, 2008. This 3-phase Test involves 1) upland bird (chukar) hunting, 2) off-lead tracking of a live pheasant, and 3) swimming. Dogs are scored over the 3 phases on 7 inherited traits. Cosmo got a near-perfect score of 110 out of 112 possible points and awarded PRIZE I for his efforts. Cosmo is a German Shorthaired Pointer also known as "Cozi the Wild Indian" or Slipstream Full Moon Flyer. Cosmo is always owner handled by his adoring breeder, Missy Neal.

Schnauzerfest 08 = Yara Fest!

On September 26, at the annual Schnauzerfest [Working Riesenschnauzer Federation-WRSF], held in Halls, TN, **Ramahills Yur Mama Dont Dance, TD, AD, 2006 WRSF Jugend Siegerin, 2008 WRSF Jahres Siegerin, V1, CGC, TDI**, Yara and Linda received their Ausdauerprufung "AD" title [endurance title]. Then on September 28, Yara was not only awarded a "V1" rating, but was also chosen as Jahres Siegerin [Best Bitch] at the show!

The WRSF is a working club and we "import" judges from Europe once a year. We have one judge for Schutzhund tests and another judge for conformation. The AD is an endurance title held within the Schutzhund venue. For large dogs, they must be at least 18 mos old and run 12.5 miles. So I say "WE" received our title because while Yara ran 12.5 mi. I biked it. The dogs are checked by the judge before the run and 2 times during it for injuries. Then at the end of the 12.5 mi., they must do an obedience routine.



The conformation follows FCI regulations. A "V1" rating [is the best rating] means the dog won their class and competes for best of their sex. More than one dog in a class can receive a "V" rating [v1, v2, etc], or no dogs. The judge critiques each dog verbally for the owner and spectators and then you also receive a written critique. It was a shock to win best bitch, but I was really thrilled. Yara is owned and loved by Linda and Ron Hurst.

Property Update: Building The Agility Field

Hi Everyone:

We have had 25 truckloads of topsoil brought to the property so that we will be able to construct the agility field. To do this, the board has approved the purchase of 20,250 square feet of Bermuda sod for the surface. Robert Herrell has volunteered to use his tractor to spread the dirt and we will rent a small Bobcat to help with the installation of the sod. **This sod is very expensive and we will have to work in a very tight timeline.** The sod comes in 108 foot rolls and needs to be installed within 3-4 days. After that, the sod will begin to grow together and rot.

Once we get the soil spread and compacted, we will spread fertilizer and lime across the entire surface. We can then use the Bobcat to help lay the sod in place. We will need volunteers to help pull the seams tight and make cuts. We will also need volunteers to help spread the fertilizer and lime. After the sod is put in place, we will need to water it and I have purchased two water sprinklers that will cover 89 square feet at a time. This is the most important and costly project we have undertaken so far at the property and we really need volunteers to help out. Please let me know if the dates of **November 7, 8, & 9** or **November 14, 15 & 16** are dates we can plan this project. This will not be very strenuous work and we can always use help to provide refreshments to the workers. Please contact me if you are able to help. Thanks.

Wilderwood Service Dogs: Foster Homes for Service Dogs

At Wilderwood Service Dogs, we make a difference in the lives of people with neurological impairments.

Often we need loving foster homes to help socialize our growing dogs. If you become a foster home, you will become involved in changing another's life forever. I can't imagine a better project for a family. Below is a list of some basic information about becoming a foster home

1. You will receive a puppy or young dog from Wilderwood (we usually use Golden Retrievers, Labs or some combination of those)

2. Wilderwood will cover all medical expenses of the dog; the family will be responsible for the food, toys, dog bed, leashes.

3. The family will be asked to train the dog in basic manners, these include:

- * Potty training
- * Chewing on appropriate toys
- * General house manners
- * Basic obedience (sit, down, come when called and wait)

4. The most important role of the foster family is Love and Socialization. We ask that the foster family take their foster dogs anywhere and everywhere in order to expose them to all sorts of people and stimuli. This is critical to a service dog's development and ultimate success.

January Agility Trials!

It's time again to think about helping at the Jan. trials!. In addition to the volunteer jobs described below, we need a Hospitality person who will ensure judges have drinks/taken to dinner each evening if judges wish and pick up/return to airport. Course Builder

Summary: Move obstacles between rounds as directed by the Chief Course Builder.

Help move equipment between classes to set the course for the next class. Requires more brawn than brains. You must be aware of when each class ends so the new course can be set quickly. Efficiency in course building can significantly affect how late a show goes. Generally, the Chief Course Builder (and then the Judge during final "tweaking") provides instruction about what pieces of equipment are needed and where to place them.

Gate Steward

Summary: Make sure dogs and handlers are ready at start line.

Armed with a running order, call out the names of handlers and dogs to make sure they are present and aware of when they will be going into the ring. You must not be too shy for this job as it can require shouting for missing handlers. You must also be prepared for nervous handlers asking repeatedly when they will be running. It's a great way to get to know names and faces. You can take a show run faster and smoother if you: Have the next three dogs ready to go; Have the next dog on the starting line--without its collar--before the previous dog finishes, if possible; Provide information to the Assistant Scribe to ensure that the running order matches the scribe sheets. **Note:** Before going to ring: Pick up running order list and pen from Score Table. (They might already be posted at ringside.)

Scribe

Summary: Make marks on paper when judge raises hand or calls out a number.

Mark down faults and points as directed by Judge on the scribe sheet while each dog is running. Scribing differs for different classes, just as judging differs. The Judge will instruct you as to the meaning of various hand signals; s/he is always pleased to provide you with a quick one-minute primer on the signals if you ask. If you ever are unclear about a Judge's signal, wait until after that run and clarify before the next dog starts. It is wise to verify that you have the correct scribe sheet for each dog. Important: You must watch only the Judge at all times during each run, never the dog or handler. **Note:** Before the first dog: Get pen and clipboard with first dog's scribe sheet from the Assistant Scribe.

Trans Scribe

Summary: Give the Scribe the correct scribe sheet for the next dog and write down the previous dog's time.

As the first dog starts, place the first dog's scribe sheet onto a clipboard and give it to the Scribe. As each dog finishes, take the clipboard with scribe sheet from the

Scribe and hand over the next scribe sheet on the second clipboard. With a two-stopwatch system, also take the stopwatch from the Timer at the end of the run, return a second zeroed stopwatch to the Timer to start the next dog, record the time on the scribe sheet, and reset the watch. This job is critical for ensuring that the Scribe writes scores on the correct scribe sheet, as there are often changes in the running order at the last minute or even during the class. When a dog has not signed in, just write Absent on scribe sheet and give it to the Scribe Runner (sometimes it is put at the end of that height as there may be conflicts) **Note:** Before going to ring: Pick up two small clipboards, scribe sheets, and two pens from Score Table.

Timer

Summary: Timing of runs (crucial)

This job requires full attention and no distractions, as focusing on the dog crossing the start line and finish line is critical. One person must time an entire jump height within a class to minimize timing differences. The Judge will give you specific instructions on timing a class before the first dog runs. The Timer is important in keeping the competition running on time, so you must cue the next dog and handler by saying "Ready!" loudly and clearly as soon as you see that the Judge is ready and you are ready to begin; you can also nod or signal with a flag but not all handlers look at the timer when starting so a loud call is important.

Runner

Summary: Take scribe sheet from Assistant Scribe to Score Table.

Runners usually take sheets from the Assistant Scribe to the Score Table one at a time. Might require a bit of walking (probably not running ☺).

Leash Runner

Summary: Take leashes from start line to finish line.

This is a very easy job often filled by children. However, you should be as invisible as possible to the handler at the start; don't demand the leash or crowd the dog in anticipation of the removal of the leash.

Ring Steward (Pole Setter/Chute Straightener)

Summary: Reset bars for height changes and when they are knocked down by dogs during a run.

Judge will instruct you before each class as to where to should sit and whether the bars are to be reset during a run; for example, if a jump is taken twice in the same run. Bars are never reset during a Gamblers run. If the course includes a collapsed tunnel, you will also straighten the tube after each dog. This is a great job for watching each dog run as you must be attentive to the happenings in the ring at all times.

Registration Check-in

Summary: Check names off a list and or make sure all know where envelopes with numbers are

If you can help first thing in the morning, you can offer your services at the Registration Table. Make sure each exhibitor gets a toy at our show

Awards

Summary: Have Ribbons ready

Get the results from the score table for a class and put printout on back of ribbons and put in baskets, also post score sheets after each class.
