KIWANIS HISTORY

Don Whiteman has undertaken the role of club historian. The following is an account of the beginnings of the Kiwanis organization

IN 1924 six permanent members of Kiwanis International attending the annual convention in Denver, Co adopted "OBJECTS OF KIWANIS " so as to establish a framework for creating a mission for the organization. Also adopted during the same convention, the first song was written for Kiwanis. George Hulmes, president of the Kiwanis Club of Denver, wrote the words to "Onward in Kiwanis" for the convention that year.

OBJECTS of KIWANIS

- To give primacy to the human and Spiritual rather than to material values of life.
- To encourage the daily living of the Golden Rule in all human relationship.
- To promote the adoption and the application of Social, business and professional standards..
- To develop, by precept and example a more intelligent, aggressive and serviceable citizenship.
- To provide, through Kiwanis clubs, A practical means to form enduring friendship, to render altruistic service and to build better communities.
- To cooperate in creating and maintaining that Sound public opinion and high idealism, which make possible the increase of Righteousness, Justice, Patriotism and Goodwill.

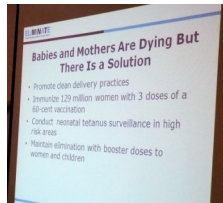
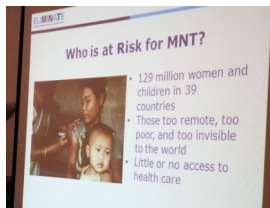
October 4th

We had 8 visitors from the Maryville Kiwanis Club chapter including Dave Rule who was the featured speaker.

Mick Gardner, past president for the 2010/2011 club year was honored with the Hixson Award, which included a \$1000 donation to KI.



Our speaker was David Rule, from Maryville. He outlined the KI Special Project, ELIMINATE. Kiwanis International is partnering with UNICEF in a global effort to *eliminate* maternal and neo-natal tetanus (MNT), a deadly but highly preventable disease that kills mothers and newborns in the world's poorest regions, The commitment is to raise US\$110 million by September 2015; with the goal of vaccinating 61 million plus women of childbearing age residing in nearly forty of the world's most impoverished countries—protecting them and their future newborns from the excruciating and deadly effects of MNT. Our BOD will be establishing a plan for implementation of a program to support this KI initiative.

TROUT IN THE CLASSROOM

In partnership with Ms. Rebecca McBride, Teacher Gr. 6, at Philadelphia Elementary School our club has introduced "Trout in the Classroom" to her curriculum. Fred Wicht has taken the lead for the Kiwanis Club of TV.

Her students will :

- Measure & monitor water conditions (quality)
- Engage in stream habitat study
- Learn to appreciate water resources
- Begin to foster a conservation ethic
- Grow to understand ecosystems

Students watch & learn as fish eggs are placed in a tank.

Students later see the eggs hatch & grow to a size that can be released into the wild.

This project is unique for teachers & students because it is a year long project that provides a hands on, flexible and exciting way for students to learn.
